

Seán Keane in Concert


Thursday 25th January

A young trans girl's tentative steps towards self-realisation, and her attempts to make her family recognise who she already knows she is, are sensitively traced in Estibaliz Urresola Solaguren's stunning debut. The eight-year-old protagonist has adopted the nickname Coco as she doesn't identify with Aitor, a male name assigned at birth. She would prefer to be called Lucia, but mother Ane, who has two other children and an ailing marriage, is struggling to view her son as a girl.

Ane, whose moral conflict is the fulcrum around which this beautifully calibrated film pivots, is following in the family tradition by working as a sculptor, under the disapproving eye of her own mother, Lita, who admonishes her for indulging Coco. It falls to her aunt, Lourdes, a beekeeper in the bucolic Spanish Basque region, to see Lucia for who she really is.

Augusto and Paulina have been together and in love for 25 years. Eight years ago, he was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, and his wife has since become his caretaker. As one of Chile's most prominent cultural commentators and television presenters, Augusto is no stranger to building an archive of memory, having been responsible for that herculean task following the Pinochet dictatorship and its systematic erasure of collective consciousness.

Now he turns that work to his own life, trying to hold on to his identity with the help of his beloved. Day by day, the couple face this challenge head-on, adapting to the disruptions brought on by the taxing disease while relying on the tender affection and sense of humor shared between them that remains intact.

Anatomy of a Fall

Wednesday 10th April

Sandra (Sandra Hüller), a German writer, her French husband Samuel, and their eleven-year-old son Daniel live in a remote town in the French Alps. When Samuel is found dead below their chalet, the police question whether he committed suicide or was killed. Samuel's death is treated as suspicious, presumed murder, and Sandra becomes the main suspect.

Justine Triet uses the conventions of the police procedural and the courtroom drama to frame her masterful interrogation of a complicated woman in Anatomy of a Fall, her third feature following In Bed with Victoria and Sibyl, and by some distance her most accomplished.

Ken Loach's latest and final film is the story of a village in Durham the Northeast of England where with the mine long closed, people feel deserted by the system. Many young people have left and what was once a thriving, proud community, now struggles to keep old values alive.

But there is also growing anger and resentment. Houses are cheap and available and this makes it an ideal location for housing Syrian refugees that have been accepted by Britain in recent years. The film centres around the local pub of the title, which is the locus for discussion on the community's changing circumstances.

Loach is recognised across Europe as one of Britain's greatest living filmmakers. Unlike virtually all his contemporaries, he has never succumbed to the siren call of Hollywood and it's virtually impossible to imagine his particular brand of British socialist realism translating well to that context.

Speaking to The Big Issue on the creation of his final film, Ken Loach explained the reason for making this movie: "we had done two films in the north-east. One about the cruelty of the social



security system where people are knowingly condemned to hunger and poverty. And one about the gig economy, the absence of basic rights at work, job insecurity. We felt we needed to tell a third story – centred in the old mining communities. Because the whole area was coal mining, shipbuilding and steel and all the old industry is gone. So what are the consequences for ordinary people?"

Across more than 60 years of filmmaking, Ken Loach has tackled all the major political issues of the day with similar conviction. From



homelessness in 'Cathy Comes Home' way back in 1966 to industrial disputes ('The Big Flame'), the exploitation of migrant workers ('It's a Free World', 'Bread and Roses'), the Iraq war ('Route Irish') and privatisation ('The Navigators'). He has turned his attention outward to conflict in Ireland ('The Wind That Shakes the Barley') and the Spanish Civil War ('Land and Freedom').

The Old Oak was a bigger challenge: "we are dealing with two very diverse and complex communities, with all sorts of nuances – to try and figure out a way to make all that work is an enormous challenge – in the writing, the casting and the directing. We are keen to avoid stereotypes all the time, of course. And every community is very, very different.

We had to find Syrians who were prepared to tell this story. And you have to treat them with respect. Every one of them has a special story, and they're scared. They're scared for their families about being identified back home. That's why at the end of the credits we say thank you to all the people who didn't want to give them names. Because so many people contributed and it's such a danger for them.

We also had to balance the trauma and what we actually see. Some of these people went through mind-boggling cruelty and trauma – so how much do we show of that? Because if you did show exactly what people lived through, you wouldn't be able to tell the other story. You would be just overwhelmed by the sheer weight of the tragedy."

Loach with his long-time screenwriter Paul Laverty reached out to groups of refugees in the north-east, talked with local groups supporting these communities or those helping combat far-right sentiment in the region.

But 'The Old Oak' is intelligently made and refuses to take pot shots at easy targets: it would, for instance, have been all too easy to demonise the locals as racists, but their dogma is driven by fear, and by anger at a general sense of powerlessness.

At 87, Ken Loach says this is his last film. We can only hope he can be tempted out of retirement. With 'The Old Oak' he has concluded with a ringing statement of faith in compassion for the oppressed.







Persistence of Vision

Breda Lynch's 'If You're Not Scared, The Atomic Bomb is Not Interesting' exhibition at The Source this Spring is part of a body of work that she has been developing and adding to for over nine years.

In the bar at The Source, as we chat about her upcoming show, Breda Lynch is telling me about Gertrude Stein's 1946 essay 'Reflections on an Atomic Bomb' which offers a central theoretical point around which her exhibition is based. Stein's essay, Lynch says, is not so much focussed on the bomb itself and it's undoubted power, but more on the huge informational spin-off it caused, an eddying half-life of images, words and ultimately thoughts. So much information she suggests that the public was saturated with a paralysing fear. Lynch re-iterates the Stein quote, still perfect for the present day: 'Everybody gets so much information all day long that they lose their common sense'.

Lynch works in a variety of media - drawing, photography, print and digital media, video and installation. She looks closely at images as vehicles which carry information and questions their inherent informational value, their mode of reproduction, format of presentation and how we ultimately consume them.

Appropriating images via the public domain, she engages in their manipulation, beginning



to free them of an original meaning. The informational value frays, becomes indistinct and ultimately changes. If we look for a cultural or narrative through-line, Lynch is interested in spinning out queer and feminist reckonings through her appropriations. It's image alchemism, trying to change commonplace or often disregarded images into their very distant golden cousin – art.

In altering the images Lynch uses the method of a 'détournement' (used by the Lettrist and Situationist movements) – a rerouting or parodying of the original image for the makers purposes.

In some works, she uses a photographic process called cyanotype – a chemically induced reaction which tilts the images towards the blue end of the spectrum and gives them – from their many sources – a flattening cohesive colouring. As an authorial signature, the process instantly allows Lynch to capture the images as her own.

But ultimately she recognises that these images are only making a stop-off with her as they continue on their journey. Her time of ownership is limited and the images will ultimately slip out of her hands to perhaps be changed by another's means, medium or placement in the future.

The exhibition at Source presents an installation of print-work and more that distills these ideas and explores the circulation of the image and fluidity of meaning.
